## SCHOLARSHIP OPPORTUNITIES FOR STUDYING IN ISRAEL

Partial scholarships may be available from the Haifa Summer Law Institute, on a competitive basis. Applicants will be notified of their eligibility.

To qualify for a scholarship award, studies must be of a post-high school nature. Study can be in programs which earn college credits. (For instance, a student may attend a yeshiva and receive credits which may be applied to his degree program at a University.) Programs at Israeli universities combining secular and Judaic studies will be reviewed by the Fund's Committee to determine eligibility on a case by case basis.

Awards will be based on a combined scholarship and need basis. The intention of the Fund is for it to be especially valuable to those students showing academic promise in religious studies and the need for financial assistance to pursue study in Israel. The scholarship is open to men and women who are not currently in Israel.

The Samuel J. Moritz Scholarship Fund was established in 1960 through a bequest from the Estate of Samuel J. Moritz to provide scholarship assistance each year to students from Israel. Stipends and direct grants may be made through this fund.

### *Other National Scholarships*

Plant your way to Israel!

JNF has developed an innovative program that will help young people sell the JNF tree certificate and raise money for the Israel experience of their choice at the same time. Youth through age 25 sell tree certificates at \$36 each. Half of the proceeds are used for planting trees in Israel (a special tree certificate is sent to a designee on behalf of the donor); the other half is placed in a special bank account on behalf of the program participant. When a minimum of 10 sales have been made, and

\$180 is accrued, the money can be used toward a trip to Israel. #### The American Jewish League for Israel - University Scholarship Fund

Stipends of varying amounts are available for U.S. undergraduate and graduate students planning to spend one year of academic study at Bar Ilan University, Ben Gurion University, Haifa University, Hebrew University, the Technion, Tel Aviv University, or the Weizman Institute of Science, or planning to participate in the Sherut La'am one year program. Awards are based on merit (i.e. student activism, past Israel experience, and scholarship) rather than solely on need.

#### Hillel Leadership Scholarship Program

This scholarship is available to sophomores and juniors who are active in Jewish programming on campus. Scholarships of up to \$1,000 are available for 11 American and 4 Canadian students attending Hebrew University on the One Year Program. Five scholarships of \$500 for a semester and \$1,000 for the year are available for students attending Ben Gurion University. In Israel, recipients participate in a creative leadership program of workshops, field trips, and individual projects and discussions. Recipients must commit to be involved with their home campus Hillel Foundation in developing Israel programming upon their return. Deadline: May 1 (for Hebrew U), June 1 (for Ben Gurion).

#### The Institute of International Education - National Security Education Program

The NSEP is a new initiative which provides scholarship assistance to US undergraduate and graduate students to study abroad in non-traditional areas (i.e., students who plan to study in Western Europe, Canada, the UK, Ireland, New Zealand, Australia are not eligible). Scholarships are available for either one semester (max of \$8,000 is available) or a full academic year (\$16,000 is available). Preference for this scholarship is given to candidates who are pursuing a career in Jewish education in the Dallas area or in Israel. Undergraduate candidates must have a GPA of 3.0 or higher and score at least 1,000 on the Scholastic Achievement Test or 24 on the ACT. Graduate students must also have at least a 3.0, score a 540 on verbal, 640 on quantitative, 600 on analytical for the GRE, or a 32 on the verbal and a 35 on the quantitative for the GMAT or an equivalent. Candidates must be Jewish and are expected to demonstrate involvement in

- A) Jewish Activities-Jewish camps/trips/retreats, organizations.
- B) Community or civic activities
- C) School related activities

Students must be enrolled in or applying for a full year with a minimum of 12 undergraduate credits

Awards range from \$250-\$2,500 and are given to individuals studying or conducting significant research or career development in Israel. \* Contact your local Synagogue. Often, synagogues have set aside funds specifically designated for sending local teens to Israel. Call your synagogue's office to learn if they offer this type of scholarship.

\* Contact your local Jewish Federation office. Most local "Federations" offer scholarships to local high school students who plan to travel to Israel. The P2I program meets the basic criteria to qualify for most of these scholarships. We have included a list of specific Federations below that offer such scholarships. \* Hit up the internet! A quick internet search will reveal numerous Jewish organizations that offer money to Jewish teens traveling to Israel. Send them an e-mail and see if you qualify. The following is not necessarily a complete list. It is advisable to check out the National Federation Directory to see what else might be available in your region.

**Akron, Ohio**

The Israel Incentive Savings Program (IISP) is a three-way partnership between a family, its congregation and the Jewish Community Board of Akron. The program is designed to assist families in sending their children on an organized Israel experience program. The Teen Israel Experience program is open to all Jewish youth entering grades 9-12. This program is appropriate for applicants who must be identified as Jewish and who reside in the jurisdiction of the Jewish Federation. Only those programs approved by the UJC (United Jewish Communities) are suitable for scholarship applications. There is a \$1000 cap on merit scholarships and a \$2000 cap on financial scholarships, therefore the maximum award for any applicant is \$3000. There is no minimum grant. Recipients of the Israel Teen Experience Scholarship are required to "give back" by promoting the program through such means as speaking before synagogue youth groups and/or addressing the Board of Directors of the Jewish Federation.
